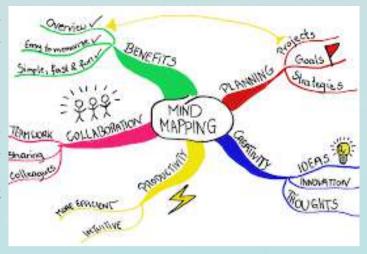

MIND MAPPING

Mind mapping is a way of linking key concepts using images, lines, and links. It was developed as an effective method of generating ideas through association. To create a mind map, one generally starts in the middle of the page with the central theme/main thought and works outward in all directions from that point to create a growth diagram made up of keywords, phrases, concepts, facts, and figures. It can be used for homework and essay writing, especially in the early stages, where it is an ideal strategy for one's "thinking"



Mind maps can be used to generate, visualize, organize, annotate, problem solve, decide, review, and clarify the college topic, so you can get started with assessment tasks. A mind map is used to generate ideas on a topic and it is a great strategy for everyone. Mind maps can be used in a wide range of situations, from brainstorming, sorting out family problems, business meetings, making notes from books or lectures, to planning a series of television programs. One must have a Central theme, associations, and themes to carry out a mind mapping it gives a clear and concise vision to everyone afterward, more and more people are adopting these methods every day. A mind map is a diagram used to represent words, ideas, tasks, or other items linked to and arranged around a central keyword or idea.

WHY IS MIND MAPPING IMPORTANT?

As Mind mapping is one of the most effective ways to capture and connect various thoughts, it not only highlights important facts but also shows the overall structure of a subject and the relative importance of individual parts of it. Evidence shows that mind mapping can be used to help you plan and organize your thinking before you start writing or get stuck into a project, this is because you can use the technique to develop all your ideas and see how they relate to each other before deciding the best approach to go about the task at hand. To achieve higher levels of concentration and creativity, together with greater organization and more concise communication, mind mapping might be an effective strategy for one to consider.

The benefits of mind mapping are many and varied. In summary, they include:

- giving you an overview of a large subject/broad topic and allowing you to represent it in a more concise fashion
- encouraging you to see the bigger picture and creative pathways
- enabling you to plan/make choices about the selection of resource material you have for an assignment and where you are going to place it
- providing you with a more attractive and enjoyable format for your eye/brain to look at, muse over and remember.





LEADERS MEET

ICA Nepal in collaboration with Gratia Center successfully conducted the Leaders "Leadership of Today in NGOs and Funding Strategies". The session was divided into three parts: a Panel discussion, a Fundraising Strategies workshop, and Networking Event. The guest of the panelist was Ms. Ishu Subba; Chairperson of ICA Nepal, Mr. Kamal Subedi; Founder of Central President of National Federation of Youth NGO Nepal, and Ms. Adwitiva Gurung; head of HR President AIESEC. The speakers for Fundraising Strategies workshop Yunusha Kafle; Executive Director of ICA Nepal, and Mr. Mohan Dangal; President of Consortium Nepal, and director at Child Nepal. The session was attended by a total of 25 participants at the Gratia Center, Kathmandu. The attendees varied from different INGO/NGOs from age groups between 18 to 35.

The panel discussion included a thorough discussion by starting with the guest's journey in the NPO sector and how they have been able to sustain all the activities along with the strategies and techniques they have encountered so far. During the Fundraising Strategies workshop, the speakers highlighted the important insights required for fundraising and how it is a very crucial component required for the sustainability of the organization.

Finally, at the Networking Event, all participants got a chance to know each other's organization and build relationships. The event was intended to provide networking connections as well as training sessions to emerging NGOs and implement strategies for funding and by the end of the session, we covered that stage in depth. The awareness among emerging NGOs and their growth was foremost during the learning session. The active participation from both the speakers and the attendees made the program very insightful and fun.











SOCIAL ARTISTRY LEADERSHIP; SPARK PROJECT:

In memorial of the Late Richard Sims, Fundraising for NGOs in Nepal launched Certificate Course on Social Artistry in August 2021. The sessions for the second batch were held in early October, followed by the third session in March 2022 in collaboration with Kalpa Academy. It is designed as a five-day session. For the first three days, participants work together to understand the tools and methods of Social Artistry and develop Spark Projects. Next, they have 15 days to implement their Spark Project with the help of their mentor. On days IV and V, participants share their learning and achievement.

The third session was participated by 35 youths from diverse geography and background. In early April, during days IV and V, all the participants returned with great stories and learnings from the Spark Project they carried out during the time duration. Each participant presented remarkable reports regarding their projects aiming at community development. Participants are provided with Rs. 5000 each as a grant. The session was facilitated by Janet Sanders, Evelyn Philbrook, Tatwa P. Timsina, Amba Datta Bhatta, Ishu Subba, Pramila KC, and Er. Ravi Khanal.

At last, every attendee had tears of joy in their eyes, visualizing their achievement. After the very successful 2day long session they all promised own selves to keep these works going and aim their Spark. All the participants were very grateful for the training and warmly thanked the mentors. They also look forward to attending these training in the near successive

future aiming at individual and community development.

MHM AWARENESS AT PARBAT

Ms. Ishu Subba and Ms. Karuna Mahat led a series of MHM awareness-raising sessions at Parbat. The session ranged from conducting awareness at local schools and women groups to local government as well. As a part of the project Subba was interviewed by the local community radio known as Ahimsabad Radio Parbat regarding the safe menstruation, and reusable pad-making training. Ms. Subba highlighted various hazards that occur due to the negligence of menstrual hygiene and how one can prevent those. The need for healthy and nutritious food along with the importance of exercise was also shared among the participants. Overall, the session remained very informative and exciting for the participants as they deeply got insights into Reproductive Health and Menstrual Hygiene Management.

CHALLENGES OF FUNDRAISING

Fundraising is the process of seeking and gathering financial contributions by engaging individuals, businesses, charitable foundations, or governmental agencies. In the process of fundraising, organizations experience several challenges. Some of the fundraising challenges include:



For NGOs

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- Building Trust: One of the biggest factors that affect charitable giving is trust from the public. Donors focus on the few organizations that fail, typically revolving around poor leadership. As a result, they are separated from charitable donations. If an organization fails, many believe that not all organizations can be trusted.
- Relying solely on donations: Different NPOs worldwide tend to rely solely on individual donations
 or the same donors which makes them on the verge of extinction. Most of them believe that the
 organization can only sustain itself from donations rather than self-funding but the key is to diversify
 income streams.
- **Giving is Inconvenient:** If you want to boost donation through the individual organization, any NPO needs to make it as simple as possible. Using contactless donation options, donors are more likely to give and do so regularly. Plus, they can give at any time, without having to be at an event. With modern donation platforms, you can make it easy for donors to give online, through your website, through social media, and in other creative ways. To reach donors, you need to connect with them and where they are at.
- Not offering something in return: If you want to boost donation through the individual organization, any NPO needs to make it as simple as possible. Using contactless donation options, donors are more likely to give and do so regularly. Plus, they can give at any time, without having to be at an event. With modern donation platforms, you can make it easy for donors to give online, through your website, through social media, and in other creative ways. To reach donors, you need to connect with them and where they are at.
- Disconnected with donors: Donors want to be a part of the story. They hate to give, never knowing where their money was used or how it made an impact. The most effective organizations invite their donors into the story. This can be as simple as providing regular updates via email or social media on the work they are doing and the lives being impacted or it could be inviting volunteers to serve alongside you, partnering hand and foot in the work you are doing. If you are looking for recurring donations, then you need to engage your donors regularly, not always asking for money.
- **Finding Ambassadors:** Another way to overcome reliance on individual donations is by implementing an ambassador program, or a peer-to-peer donation program. Rather than having individuals donate directly to your organization, you enlist ambassadors. They create their campaign to raise awareness for the social issues they are working to solve. As a result, they reach new donors who give to their campaign, which ultimately raises funds for your organization. Finding passionate ambassadors who share the same vision as you can be the key to expanding your reach.

HELP US BUILD HOUSES FOR DWARFS (LITTLE PEOPLE) OF NEPAL

My name is (Ms) Sundari Mishra. My height is just 47 inches. I represent the Dwarf community of Nepal. You may have never given a thought that the life of people with Dwarfism is exhausting both physically and mentally. I face mockery and discrimination all day long. Because of my short stature, I face challenges in traveling, using public toilets, or even using my kitchen. On the other hand, when I use infrastructure designed for regular stature, my health status deteriorates as the premature bones accelerate.

Due to limited opportunities in income generation, often, I have to struggle to meet my ends. I am just an example of thousands of Nepali dwarf brothers and sisters. There are many things that we, dwarf people, can work together and fulfill our needs independently. I am raising funds collectively for these good deeds along with different organizations to establish a Learning Centre that will accommodate and provide training to people like me which would eventually help us to generate income for better living.



This center will typically be designed to meet the physical requirements of Dwarf people and will be friendly to us such as bathroom stall locks, kitchen slabs, stairs, etc. This Centre will be operated by a team of Dwarf people to train and accommodate the hundreds of Nepali Dwarfs.

We, Creative Dwarf Women Association, are seeking generous hands to be part of this noble cause. I am very overwhelmed that the **Fundraising for NGOs in Nepal** has encouraged me to share this good cause with you all.
